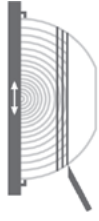
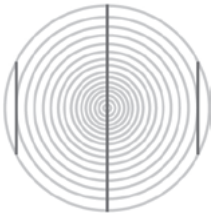
Decorative hardwood is a valuable resource. To maximize its value and beauty, it is pivotal to select the right way to cut the log.

- Rotary cutting



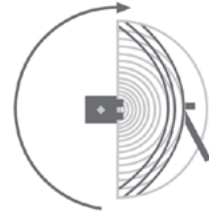
FLAT CUTTING



Log sawn in half; sliced from the outside

Crown appearance with stripy sides

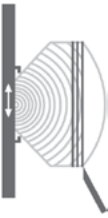
STAY-LOG CUTTING



Log sawn in half; peeled from the outside

Wide crown appearance with narrower stripy sides

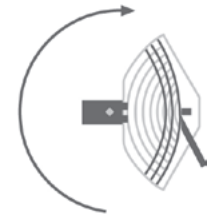
FLAT QUARTER CUTTING



Log sawn in quarters; sliced from the outside

Wide crown appearance with narrower stripy sides

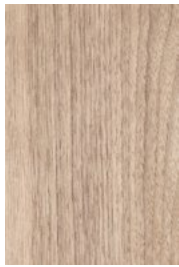
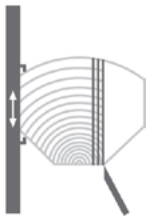
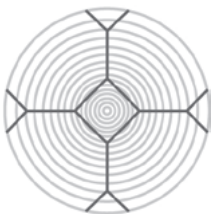
CUTTING FROM THE HEART



Log sawn in thirds (or quarters); peeled from the inside

Narrow crown appearance with wider stripy sides

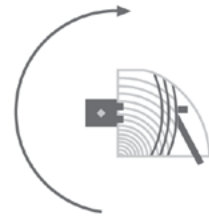
TRUE QUARTER CUTTING



Log sawn in quarters; sliced perpendicular to the annual growth rings

Stripy appearance

RIFT CUTTING



Log sawn in quarters; peeled at an angle to the annual growth rings

Stripy appearance

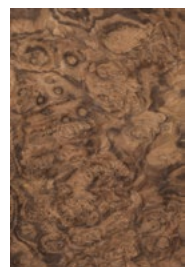
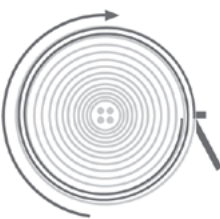
BASTARD QUARTER CUTTING



Log sawn in quarters; sliced at a flat angle to the annual growth rings

Half crown appearance with one stripy side

ROTARY CUTTING



Entire log or log parts; centrally peeled in a rotary movement

Irregular grain pattern, emphasizing on natural characteristics such as decorative burl structure
