
MULTIPLYING BEAUTY

Log sawn in half;


peeled from the outside

FLAT QUARTER CUTTING








Wide crown appearance with narrower stripy sides

CUTTING FROM THE HEART








Log sawn in thirds (or quarters); peeled from the inside

growth rings


sliced perpendicular to the annual

RIFT CUTTING








Log sawn in quarters; peeled at an angle to the annual growth rings

growth rings


sliced at a flat angle to the annual






Half crown appearance with one stripy side
